## SALHN High Risk Foot Service update: education evening wrap up - a "total success"

The SALHN Interdisciplinary High-Risk Foot Team, with the support of Convatec, hosted their first education evening for GP's, Practice Nurses and Community Nursing on Thursday 27 June at the Marion Hotel, with over 40 participants.

The event provided the opportunity to meet and greet members of the interdisciplinary care team and ask questions.

Speakers included Dr Phil Puckridge, SALHN Vascular Head of Unit, Dr Tilenka Thynne, Consultant Endocrinologist and Clinical Pharmacologist, and Sarah Christie, SALHN High Risk Foot Coordinator/Senior Podiatrist.

## Clinical tips

Some key take aways from the night included:

- Always examine the feet shoes and socks off!
- When considering Diabetes Management also include Cardiovascular and Renal Management of those living with Diabetes.
- Time is tissue early referral is key, wound duration is associated with increased risk of amputation and poorer outcomes and failure of wound healing.
- Toe pressures do not hold all the answers, they are useful as a screening tool. When an ulcer fails to show signs of healing within 4-6 weeks despite optimal management, we need to consider angiography and revascularisation irrespective of ABI of ABI's, toe pressures and arterial duplex.

Participants Needed! - Bridging the gap: a pilot project assessing efficacy and safety of a conscious sedation pathway for consumers with neurodevelopmental disability to access early health intervention.

Dr Jessica Smith, GP/Rehabilitation Physician (SALHN), is excited to share a pilot program for a multitiered sedation pathway, with the hope that this evidence will help establish formal pathways in the future for adults with complex disabilities in the community.

To be a part of this project, the team are looking for people:

- with an intellectual or developmental disability (such as autism)
- 18 years or older
- have not been able to have a blood test or immunisation.

The aim is to show safety and efficacy in the desensitisation and light sedation tiers (performed by a non-anaesthetist with additional training).

#### **SALHN Hepatology Nurses**

Meet SALHN's Hepatology Nurses, Rosalie and Rachel!

SALHN's Hepatology Nurses provide a link between public hospital specialist services and general practice, giving specialised support to general practitioners to assist in the management of patients with hepatitis B or hepatitis C, among other things.

The team are playing their part in the World Health Organisation Strategy to "Eliminate Hepatitis C by 2030".



They are keen to work closely with southern GPs to improve the screening of particularly vulnerable patients and offer a tailored/flexible approach to support GPs and patients with the treatment and management of Hepatitis C.

The Hepatology Nurses have supported southern GPs in various ways, from taking on the Hepatitis C management and treatment for patients to supporting GPs to manage and treat their patients and somewhere in between!

The Hepatology Nurses strongly encourage you to call their service (they are happy to take calls if you feel appropriate whilst your patient is in the consulting room to allow quick action linking up to their pharmacy resources etc).

## Omega-3 Test-and-Treat Program: reducing preterm births

Updated NHMRC Pregnancy Care guidelines advise omega-3 supplementation for pregnant women with low omega-3 levels to reduce their risk of prematurity.

The Omega-3 Test-and-Treat Program (O3TTP), a partnership between SAHMRI and SA Pathology, is integrated into the SA Maternal Serum Antenatal Screening (SAMSAS) program and offers omega-3 testing for women with singleton pregnancies under 20 weeks gestation and provides tailored supplementation advice based on the results.

- In South Australia (SA), 1 in 10 babies are born preterm.
- Over 18,000 women have participated in the O3TTP since 2021, with around 17% showing low omega-3 levels, potentially benefiting from supplementation to reduce preterm birth risk.
- Currently, 54% of Health Providers in the Southern Adelaide Local Health Network are referring women for SAMSAS with omega-3 testing. About 80% of pregnant women need to engage with the program to successfully see reductions of prematurity in the community.
- Consider referring your pregnant patients for omega-3 testing before 20 weeks gestation
  - o check the omega-3 box on the SAMSAS form or
  - o write "omega-3 to SAMSAS" on any standard pathology form.
