How to do quality improvement in Allied Health

AIM:

- To introduce the concept of quality in allied health
- To showcase different frameworks for quality improvement in allied health
- To provide tools and strategies for measuring quality in allied health

OBJECTIVE:

Quality – a commonly used term in health care and everyone wants quality health care. But what does "quality" actually mean and how do we define it, capture it and evaluate it? The workshop will outline both theoretical and practical aspects of commonly used quality improvement strategies, as well as showcase emerging initiatives that can be readily implemented in allied health settings.
